Tour Introduction

Well...what a trip! This 12-Day photo tour through Arizona's desert, sky islands, grasslands, forest and parks was one for the ages. Four friends from Quebec joined me late June through mid July for a sojourn around Arizona. This time of year, Arizona is warm there is no denying that. We employ a strategy that works well to get around being out in the middle of the day and besides, this is a photo tour right?? Because we're after the good light, we are out early in the morning and later in the afternoon with a nice rest period during the midday heat. This tour is broken up in sections where we spent roughly 3-days in each.

Our first section is the Tucson deserts, parks and Catalina Mountain ranges. Here the deserts are the hottest but offer some of the Sonoran specialties like Gilded Flicker, Rufous-winged Sparrow, Harris's Hawk and the spectacular Lesser Nighthawk. The rest of our time in this area is spent in various parks targeting things like Greater Roadrunner, Vermilion Flycatcher, Black-tailed Gnatcatchers and the iconic Pyrrhuloxia. When the desert gets to hot, we head up in altitude to the iconic Mount Lemmon. Here the warblers reign supreme and I am happy to say that even though this time of year is not the best time to photograph them, we still managed some really decent shots! Then we head for the Sky Islands...

The first of our sky-island sets were the Santa Ritas. The famous Madera Canyon calls this mountain range home and thankfully it produced some great birds for us. Birds like; Elegant Trogon, Bridled Titmouse, Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher, and a visiting Berylline Hummingbird. Here we also managed some great SW special owls, the Whiskered Screech and the worlds smallest owl, the fierce Elf Owl.

Our second set of mountain ranges are the Huachuca's. Here We visit several feeding stations and one, maybe two mountain roads where hummingbirds like; Violet-crowned and Lucifer await our lenses and more SW special birds like Greater Pewee and Buff-breasted Flycatcher and Virginia's Warbler are targeted.

We end the trip in the famed Chiricahua mountains and the small towns of Portal and Paradise. Here the Junipers, Pine and Chihuahuan Desert hold an incredible variety of special birds and photographic opportunities. We were pleased to pick up some great birds like the incredibly range restricted Mexican Chickadee, the feisty Scaled Quail, the spooky Mexican Whip-poor-will and even the elusive Montezuma Quail! From here, we traveled back to Tucson, had one final delicious sushi lunch and wrapped up our tour...pretty amazing and happy people all around for sure!

Tour Summary

Day 1 - (June 29th): Arrival Day/Afternoon around Tucson

We start this tour on this first afternoon with a quick dinner. The method for this tour is to have early dinners and then stay out until sunset which is usually around 7:30pm. This works out well in most cases as we also have a brunch around 10:00am. We do this mainly because we generally have to start around 5am to get the best light from sunrise until about 9:00am. After which the sun is too intense and the heat has started. This is the pattern for the entire tour which allows a nice rest period in the middle of the day for editing photos, reading, relaxing or catching up on some sleep. After a nice dinner, we got to work.

In several spots around Tucson, we visited mostly the stunning Sonoran Desert. As this is my backyard, I know exactly where to get all of the specialties and on this first afternoon, that's exactly what we did. We managed some great shots of; Pyrrhuloxia, Verdin, Curve-billed Thrasher, Black-tailed Gnatcatcher, Black-throated Sparrow, Lesser Nighthawk and Rufous-winged Sparrow.

Day 2 - (June 30th): A Day on Mount Lemmon

The iconic Mount Lemmon called to us for this day. Mount Lemmon is really cool...over 7 different habitats call this mountain home and we enjoyed photographing our way through them all the way to the top. Not all of them are great for photos and hold birds we needed but overall we had great success on the mountain. We started at the base which is more Sonoran Desert. Here we added; Gilded Flicker, Gila Woodpecker, Brown-crested Flycatcher, Bell's Vireo, Blue Grosbeak, Lucy's Warbler, and a fun and charismatic Rock Wren. We essentially use the mountain as a temperature regulator. As the day goes on and the temperature rises, we continue go higher in elevation, experiencing a new set of habits every 800-1000ft. It really is a beautiful drive and a very fun mountain. Now it was time to leave the desert and continue headed up the hill, carefully avoiding the now growing density of cyclists! Next up...

I stopped briefly in the Juniper hill section to look for Black-chinned Sparrow and Woodhouse's Scrub Jay. Unfortunately, no luck on either but we did manage a really nice Spotted Towhee.

We continued up and made our first stop at the first real section of Pine Forest, Rose Canyon Lake. This campground area is typically the best place on the mountain to find the warblers that most people know can be found on Mount Lemmon. The clients knew before coming on this tour that late June/early July IS NOT the time for warblers (that would be May) but even so, they still wanted to give them a try which of course, I was happy to do. Well...there is no other way to say it...we didn't get them. I heard just about all of them but they were uncooperative. No worries though, I know this mountain, I know these birds, I knew exactly where my backup spot was going to be so I was yet to worry. We did run into a few other targets like; Yellow-eyed Junco, Plumbeous Vireo and we had a decent photoshoot with a Painted Redstart. Once we were done here, I took the group up a little higher into some thinner pines where again, I got skunked out of finding a nice cooperative group of warblers. This was a "on the way" check that I sort of guessed wouldn't work out but felt I had to try it...ya know? Anyway, up next, it was time for the main location for these birds.

Marshall's Gulch is the primo location for these birds and here is where we nailed both of our big warbler targets, the Red-faced Warbler and Grace's Warbler. We also managed a stunning Hepatic Tanager. Pretty excited to get these considering the timing!

Now at the top of the mountain in what can only really be described as meadow and very thin pine trees mixed in with birch trees. Here we nailed our main target, the Broad-tailed Hummingbird and as a sweet bonus, we had a great photo shoot with a a Steller's Jay. After a fantastic lunch at the Sawmill Restaurant where I had a great pulled-pork sandwich, we began our long journey down the mountain. I missed one bird (by that I mean didn't hear it) that I thought was weird and as luck would have it, while driving down, I spotted my bird flying around in the gulch next to the road. So, back down in more of a Sonoran Desert mixed with a little Western Riparian Woodland, we were able to find and photograph a stunning male Hooded Oriole. A wonderful day in the mountains!

Day 3 (July 1st): Tucson Parks to Elephant Head Son (Green Valley)

The first step for the day was to find a few more of our desert specialties and for this, I have just the spot north of Tucson. It may or may not be a golf course BUT it has some great birds. Here we found; Vermilion Flycatcher, Greater Roadrunner, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Ladder-backed Woodpecker, and we didn't get any really great shots but we didn't manage some decent ones of Purple Martin (a different race than the eastern bird). The highlight though as a pari of Bobcat that came out to entertain us for a few minutes...So cool! It was getting a bit late now but I had to continue to try and get some better shots of the martin and to find a bird I surprising didn't see at the gold course. So, I drove north towards my own home to a local patch I know held all of those birds. Again, nothing great on the Martin but we did add a nice Harris's Hawk (not great on light but still, great bird!). Once we were done here, we headed south towards Green Valley.

After brunch, traveling down to Green Valley and taking a quick rest in our hotel, we ventured out for our appointment at Elephant Head Pond. Again this is not prime time here at the pond but we were hoping to grab a few things. It was a bit slow but we managed some cool things like; Gambel's Quail, Hooded Oriole, Northern Cardinal, Canyon Towhee, White-winged and Mourning Dove, House Finch and House Sparrow. Haha - Oh well...not the sort of shoot we were hoping for but the good news is we had great luck previously in the desert and I intended to make even more luck later on in the trip. After this, we went back to our hotel and called it an evening.

Day 4 (July 2nd): Santa Rita Mountains (Madera and Box Canyons)

The early morning was spent in Madera Canyon. Here we spent some time at the Santa Rita Lodge bird feeders and then went on a quick walk up Carrie Nation Trail when I am happy to say we found our main target, the stunning Elegant Trogon. Other great birds on the trail included, Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher, Painted Redstart, and the adorable Bridled Titmouse. The time we spent at the feeders gave us some decent shots at Rivoli's, Broad-billed, Costa's and Black-chinned Hummingbird. One of our main hummingbird targets did not reveal itself but we had another morning to try for that one. Overall, Madera Canyon was very good to us.

The afternoon was also spent in the Santa Rita Mountains but this time, over in Box Canyon. Our main target for this afternoon is a summer time breeder to our great state. Just a few checks later and we were able to find our colorful Varied Bunting. Spectacular bird, truly! Next up, a quick but productive photoshoot with the resident Five-striped Sparrow...easy as 1,2,3! So easy in fact that we decided to push our luck and try for some local nightlife. We couldn't mange a decent shot of a Mexican Whip-poor-will BUT we had some great luck in Madera Canyon with a Whiskered Screech Owl and the smallest member of the family, the Elf Owl. What a great way to end the day, WHOOP!



Day 5 (July 3rd): Santa Rita Mountains (Madera Canyon) to Huachuca Mountains

The early morning was spent at Santa Rita Lodge and luckily this time we managed to get our hummingbird target...and just after a short wait! A stunning male Berylline Hummingbird made a quick appearance but choice a pretty sweet place to perch up for our cameras.

We then took a trip over to Las Cienegas NCA area to look for two sparrows. Unfortunately, we only managed 1 out of the 2 sparrows and in fact, we'd never find that last one throughout the entire tour even though I checked countless times. The one we did manage however was a pretty cool little Botteri's Sparrow.

Now in the Huachuca Mountains, I decided to check out one of my favorite gardens in the area, Ash Canyon Bird Sanctuary. This location is great for all hummingbirds and a place that we would be visiting multiple times during our time in the Huachuca Mountains. This area is great for a lot of hummingbirds as I mentioned above but for one special one specifically and luckily we did not have to wait long to lay our eyes and cameras on the stunning Lucifer Hummingbird. We hung out here for the rest of the afternoon, picking up some cool birds like; Lesser Goldfinch, Anna's, Costa's, Black-chinned and Broad-billed Hummingbirds, Phainopepla (only one lucky guest managed to get the male, the rest of us settled for a stunning female), Hooded and Bullock's Oriole, House Sparrows, Bushtit, Brown-headed Cowbird, White-winged Dove, Mexican Jay and an adorable Desert Cottontail. A storm was starting to brew so we called in an evening and went into town for a nice dinner, Italian! Great stuff:D. The other good news with the storm rolling in is that typically, the mornings after a storm are quite cloudy and generally very productive. This was good news for my plan in the morning...continue reading to see what else we managed in the Huachuca's!

Day 6 (July 4th): Huachuca Mountains Cont.

YES! The morning indeed was clouded over just like I had hoped and predicted given the storm the night before. So, it was a perfect day to head up one of my favorite canyons in this region. So, bright and early we started up the bumpy and frankly poorly maintained (in terms of road conditions) Carr Canyon. I love this canyon as typically the birds are quite cooperative and its not overly crowded with people...perfect. Given how well we had been doing, I actually only had 5 real targets for the morning and 2 of them I knew were going to be really tough. Nevertheless, we began and, we began well. I stopped off at my secret little spot (probably not but I like to think so...haha) and nailed a beautiful Rufous-crowned Sparrow. We continued up the mountain and stopped off at Reef Townsite Campground to hopefully get our next target. Happily, right out of the car I picked up the chip note of the Buff-breasted Flycatcher and we were able to have a fun shoot with this bird. Continuing towards the end of the road, I stopped off at a hillside I knew to be good for our next bird and again, a short wait later landed us a fun visit by a pair of Greater Pewee. Three out of five quite quickly! But... these were the three I was expecting...now for the hard ones. We searched very hard and we were rewarded with visuals and some very "eh" photos of the last two birds, a Virginia's Warbler and a Woodhouse's Scrub Jay. Not the great quality I'd aim for but still great to see some new birds. I was quite happy with our haul so we went down the mountain for brunch.

The afternoon was spent back in Ash Canyon Bird Sanctuary in order for the guests to get more images of the Lucifer Hummingbird. I didn't take any new photos but of course, we enjoyed our time here immensely. After a great day, we enjoyed a fantastic dinner and then went off to bed.

Day 7 (July 5th): Huachuca Mountains Cont.

We spent another great morning at Ash Canyon Bird Sanctuary...this time hoping for the elusive Montezuma Quail to make an appearance. It had been coming in off and on for the last few weeks so we thought we'd give it a go considering the outrageously good success we were having. Unfortunately, after several hours of waiting, no Montezuma Quail's made an appearance but we did add a stunning Bronzed Cowbird and a feisty Dusky-capped Flycatcher to our growing portfolios. With he addition of the Dusky-capped Flycatcher, we managed to photograph all of the possibile targets within the genus Myiarchus which is kind of fun! After a good morning, we continued towards brunch and then had our nice mid-day break.

The afternoon was spent in another great canyon with hummingbird feeders. This time, we chose to spend our afternoon shooting time in Beatty's Guest Ranch in Miller Canyon. Here we had one main target and thankfully, he was a territory one! The stunning Violet-crowned Hummingbird can sometimes be a tough bird to photograph on this tour during this time but this was so easy it was ridiculous! He used several really nice perches over and over again throughout the afternoon giving us plenty of opportunities to photograph him. With the light fading fast due to another incoming storm, we decided to call it a night and ventured towards our hotel. I wanted to get everyone back a little earlier for tonight because I wanted to take them all over to Willcox in the morning which is a decent drive so it was important that they and frankly, I, get some sleep for another big day ahead.

Day 8 (July 6th): Willcox and Patagonia

As I mentioned above, we had a long drive today, about an hour and 20-min or so...so to be at our destination by sunrise, we left our hotel right about 4am and headed off in the night towards Willcox. We arrived at Twin Lakes Golf Course (Lake Cochise) in perfect time only to find my usual place for Scaled Quail had recently been shut...dam...well, no worries, a quick fix picking a different road gave us some decent opportunities at this bird but not what I was looking for... I'll keep that in mind for future shoots. Here we also had a fun shoot with the newly split Chihuahua Meadowlark (showing off the extra white tail and one of the reasons for it's split from Eastern Meadowlark!), Northern Mockingbird and a decent shoot (to be improved upon later) with a Bendire's Thrasher.

After this good luck, we checked out the lake. Here with some still decent light, we enjoyed some of the water birds of this pond. Birds like; American Avocet, Black-necked Stilt, Killdeer and the reason we came here, a stunning group of Wilson's Phalarope, with some females even in some good breeding plumage! We also ran into a very chill Swainson's Hawk that allowed us to get some decent photos just about the time the light started getting a bit on the harsh side.

After our standard afternoon break, we ventured over to another far away destination, Patagonia. The guests really wanted to try and photograph the Rose-throated Becard and though I told them this was highly unlikely, we still gave it a shot. Though we saw it, we weren't able to get a photo of the female we saw. Around the same area we also had some decent luck with a Thick-billed Kingbird (weird side-lighting which I growing more fond of each time I look at it!), and a very cute Northern Beardless Tyrannulet. After these fun pics, I went towards one of my best spots for a normally difficult bird. I am happy to saw that just near the Paton's Center for Hummingbirds, we were able to have a very unusually excellent photo shoot with 4-5 Yellow-breasted Chat. Very great way to end the day!

Day 9 (July 7th): Huachuca to Chiricahua Mountains

We went back to Beatty's Guest Ranch in Miller Canyon for the morning and unfortunately not many good shots came out of that experience for me. We were waiting from some Black-chinned and Rivoli's Hummingbirds to do some cool stuff but unfortunately, that never happened. Oh, well, that happens! After brunch, we hit the road towards Portal. After a roughly 2hr drive, we checked into our lodge to pass the heat of the day and wait for the good light. Once we got a little of what we were looking for, we hit the road. We didn't have much success with the stuff I had hoped for but rather luckily, we did have some incredible luck with possibly the hardest target of this area, the skittish and elusive Montezuma Quail... unbelievable. This would be the only time we'd see this bird though we'd search many more times. That's birds for ya!







Days 10-12 (July 8th -10th): Chiricahua Mountains to Tucson

The last section of this tour takes place in the famous Chiricahua Mountains. I am going to combine this section because we visit the same few roads multiple times per day looking for various birds to photo. It is very similar to Sierra Vista in the sense tat the same areas are visited multiple times in order to get the best photos of the birds we're after. Locations like; The George Walker House was this years location for the stunning White-eared Hummingbird. The Portal-Paradise Road held targets like; Western Screech Owl, Mexican Whip-poor-will, Scott's Oriole, Juniper Titmouse, and Cassin's Kingbirds. Then there was our fantastic accommodation, Cave Creek Ranch which gave us some great opportunities at Blue-throated Mountain Gem and the special Arizona Woodpecker. We also took advantage of access to the Chihuahuan Desert nearby on the New Mexico border. Here we picked up great birds like; Crissal Thrasher, Cactus Wren, Scaled Quail, Loggerhead Shrike and Canyon Towhee. And finally the mountainous pine-tree laden Rustler and Barfoot Parks held one of our most rare and range restricted species of the entire tour, the Mexican Chickadee. Overall the Chiricahua's were very good to us. The guests loved this section of the tour, as did I!
