## **Tour Introduction**

Over the past few months I have been asked "Ben, what's a really good Africa tour that is also really good for mammals and a little bit of photography...say I wanted to do Africa once, where would you go?" Well, after this, my second Tanzania tour, I can confidently say that our Tanzania tour is that tour. An incredibly display of bird and mammal life in this spectacularly rich country will give you an amazing overall African experience.

This tour included the extension into the Usambara Mountains and to the tiny but awesome little Pemba Island. The Usambara Mountains are tough birding and that was not made any easier by the non-stop rain. This dense forest environment can be tough but the guests did really well here, picking up a lot of species. Once we hit Pemba Island, we began our search for the four endemics as well as a host of other great birds like Mangrove Kingfisher and Crab Plover.

Once we started "the Milk Run", the weather unfortunately never really improved but overall only affected us a little bit but the guests did have fun counting the rainy days and the net result was near as makes no difference, rain every single day of the tour. Sometimes it was a quick shower and sometimes a torrential downpour. Luckily this didn't stop us from seeing amazing birds and wildlife, including a 5 cat trip, an impressive display of colorful birds like parrots, turacos, storks, pelicans and finches and of course, witnessing one of the greatest spectacles on earth, the wildebeest and zebra migration into the Serengeti.

Overall I would classify this tour as a massive success and most of that is due to the wonderful team we have on the ground and the amazing guests that were on this trip. Birding by vehicle is not easy but these guests were truly excellent at getting on birds, helping to spots mammals and then there was our driver and local guide, absolutely top notch and by no means would we have the success rate we do without his expertise, especially the navigating tricky roads under extreme weather conditions. I know I personally can't wait to get back to Tanzania and until you yourself visit, enjoy this report...cheers!

# **Tour Summary**

# March 29th (Day 1): Katambuga House to Same and Mkomazi National Park

The first day of this tour is always exciting and always a little slow to start due to the nearly 5hr drive we have to take to get to Samé and Mkomazi National Park. The roads are slow and the early morning start means we can't really bird the grounds before hand so really, until our lunch stop, we don't see that many birds. Once we stopped for lunch however...it was game on. We found some great birds like; Red-cheeked Cordonbleu, Cut-throat, Lesser Masked Weaver, White-browed Sparrow Weaver, Bronze Mannikin, Village Indigobird, Pin-tailed Whydah, Little Swift, African Palm Swift, White-browed Coucal, Abdim's Stork, Hadada Ibis, Peregrine Falcon, Red-billed Quelea, and Reichenow's Seedeater. We also saw some really cool Horse-nosed Bats roosting right out in the open on a tree trunk! A nice start but it was time to continue on to our location.




After this great lunch, we continued on towards our primary location. We entered Mkomazi National Park in the early part of the afternoon allowing us some good birding time before needing to make our overnight halt at Baboo's Camp. This park is absolutely packed with birds and for our first afternoon we were introduced to some of the parks more common birds like; Wahlberg's Eagle, Von der Decken's Hornbill, African Gray Hornbill, Helmeted Guineafowl, Pangani Longclaw, Northern Gray-headed Sparrow, White-winged Widdowbird, Staw-tailed Whydah, Fischer's Starling, White-bellied Go-Away-Bird, Gabar Goshawk, White-rumped Shrike, Red-tailed Shrike, Eastern Violet-backed Sunbird, Emerald-spotted Wood-Dove, Augur Buzzard, Black-winged Kite, Lilac-breasted Roller, Long-tailed Fiscal, Yellow-necked Sprufowl, Northern Red-billed Hornbill, Superb Starling, Blue-cheeked Bee-eater, Purple Grenadier, Red-billed and White-headed Buffalo Weaver. We also had a pretty lucky view of a Verreaux's Eagle flying along the cliffs at the entrance of the park...wild! Honestly the list goes on and on as this park is truly packed with species.

#### March 30th (Day 2): Mkomazi National Park

This day is a new addition to this tour. We have never had a full day in Mkomazi Nation Park... and I am DELIGHTED to say it paid off wonderfully. We had some amazing experiences with great birds like; White Helmetshrike, Golden-breasted Starling, Fischer's Starling, Blue-cheeked, Little and European Bee-eater, Chestnut Weaver, Spur-winged Goose, Crested Francolin, Firefronted Bishop, Red-eyed, Laughing, Ring-necked Doves, Hartlaub's Bustard, Eastern Chanting Goshawk, White-bellied Go-Away-Bird, Pied and Common Cuckoo, African Swift, African Openbill, Bateleur, Common Buzzard, Red-and-yellow and D'Arnaud's Barbet, Lesser and Greater Honeyguide, Vitelline Masked Weaver, Eurasian Golden Oriole, Rosy-patched Bushshrike, Flappet Lark, Red-faced Crombec, Ashy, Tiny, and Rattling Cisticola, Red-rumped, Barn, and Lesser Striped Swallow, Willow Warbler, Greater Whitethroat, Tsavo, Hunter's and Scarlet-chested Sunbirds, Green-winged Pytillia, Crimson-rumped Waxibill, Eastern Paradise Whydah and Yellow-spotted Bush Sparrow. We added our first set of great animals like; Yellow Baboon, African Elephant (a quite exciting bluff charge and territorial stand-off!!), Boehm's Common Zebra, Masai Giraffe, Impala, Coke's Hartebeest, Slender Mongoose and Flap-necked Chameleon. It is very common in this park to have over 100 species days...no problem! Such an amazing place.

#### March 31st (Day 3): Mkomazi National Park to Western Usambara Mountains

Now unfortunately, it was time to leave. A wonderful first "Safari" but now it was time to get on with the real reason for this extension, the Usambara Mountains. We made one stop off at "Zebra Camp" for lunch where we managed a few great birds like; Eastern Violet-backed Starling, Green-backed Camaroptera, Purple Heron, Wire-tailed Swallow, Great Reed Warbler, Zanzibar Red Bishop, Taveta Golden Weaver, White-faced Whistling Duck, Striped, Pied and Malachite Kingfisher, and a couple of Brown-breasted Barbet.

After we finished up here, we left for Lushoto to pick up our local guide for our time in the Western Usambaras. The afternoon wasn't overly productive as we had quite a bit of rain and terrible weather overall. We actually had some pretty tough weather during our entire time in the Usambaras, really hitting us in the proverbially gut but we did our best throughout the western and eastern portion of this section. In the paragraph below I will list out some of the highlights from the west from both this afternoon, our full day and half morning.

#### April 1st (Day 4): Full Day in the Western Usambaras

As mentioned, our time in the Western Usambaras was heavily impacted by weather but we managed to still do pretty well. We hit loads of hotspots over and over again. Highlights for us were; Usmabara Double-collared Sunbird, Pin-tailed Whydah, African Wood Owl, African Black Duck, Delegorgue's Pigeon, Hartlaub's Turaco, Long-crested Eagle, Olive Sunbird, Augur Buzzard, Cinnamon-chested Bee-eater, African Palm Swift, Horus Swift, White-rumped Swift, White-eared Barbet, Black-fronted Bushshrike, Common Square-tailed Drongo, Lizard Buzzard, Giant Kingfisher, Shikra, Lesser and Scaly-throated Honeyguide, Mombasa Woodpecker, Black Cuckooshrike, Lanner Falcon, Rock Martin, Mountain Wagtail, White-starred Robin, Stripecheeked Greenbul, Eurasian Golden Oriole, Short-tailed Batis, White-tailed Crested Flycatcher, African Tailorbird, Bar-breasted and Black-headed Apalis, Cinnamon Bracken Warbler, Shelley's, Eastern Mountain and Cabana's Greenbul, Yellow-throated Woodland Warbler, Waller's Starling, Usambara Thrush, Usambara Akalat, Spot-throat, Uluguru Violet-backed Sunbird, Village Weaver, Yellow Bishop, Abyssinian Crimsonwing, Yellow-bellied Waxbill, Cabanis's Bunting, Fulleborns Boubou and Southern Yellow White-eye, A decent hall considering most of our days were heavily affected by rain. We also saw; Two-horned Chameleon, Tanganikan Mountain Squirrel, Striped Skink, Lushoto Sun Squirrel, Black-andwhite Colobus, and Blue Monkey.

#### April 2nd (Day 5): Western Usambaras to Eastern Usambaras

Today we made the journey down the western side of the mountains. Because of the road situation, it is actually faster for a car to go down the mountain, around, then back up the other side rather than taking the shorter steeper and very rocky/bumpy short-cut. That road is more conducive to motorcycles and as the one sitting in the back, I thought this was a brilliant idea.

All of the birds seen during this morning were noted in the paragraph above with the exception of a African Golden Weaver and Coastal Cisticola. The drive over is long but luckily, our fantastic driver made it as comfortable as possible and so just after about 5hrs of travel, we arrived in the Eastern ranges of the Usambaras. As with before, the paragraph below will host the highlights from this afternoon, a full day and a morning in the Eastern Usambaras.

#### April 3rd (Day 6): Full Day in Eastern Usambaras

Nearly all of our time in East Usambara was wandering around the roads so I am lumping them all into the location "East Usambara". We also had incredibly poor weather here unfortunately but still managed some good birds like; African Broadbill, Blue-spotted Wood Dove, Fischer's Turaco, Klaas's Cuckoo, Crowned Eagle, Black Goshawk, Speckled Mousebird, Brown-hooded Kingfisher, Mustached and Yellow-rumped Tinkerbird, Greenbacked Woodpecker, Pale Batis, Black Sawwing, Red-backed Shrike, Amani, Olive and Collared Sunbird, Silvery-cheeked Hornbill, African Green-Pigeon, Little Rush Warbler, African Stonechat, Red-tailed Ant-Thrush, Long-billed Tailorbird, Forest Weaver, Kretschmer's Longbill, Black-bellied Starling, African Goshawk, White-browed Robin Chat, Black-and-white and Bronze Mannikin, and unfortunately a guide only Sharpe's Akalat and Little Greenbul.

# April 4th (Day 7): Eastern Usambaras to Pemba Island

Today we said goodbye to our local Usambara guide and headed for the airport in Tanga. We managed a bit of birding during the morning but we really needed to get to the airport to make our journey towards the last section of this extension, Pemba Island. After several hopper planes, we finally landed on the lovely Pemba Island. This year I changed the hotel for our stay and I am delighted to say it was a positive change. Much more comfortable than the last one, with much better food, incredible service, terrific ocean side accommodation all around...beautiful! The rain just did not let up but despite this, we managed all of the endemics as well as just about every target we needed except for one, the African Pygmy Goose...this is a tough bird in general so overall, I was incredibly happy with our final species grab for the extension. The next entry will host the species highlights from our afternoon, full day and brief morning on Pemba.

#### April 5th (Day 8): Full Day on Pemba Island

With our local guide and driver we really did quite well. We had some great looks at birds like; Water Thick-knee, White-backed Duck, Pemba Green Pigeon, Pemba White-eye, Pemba Sunbird, Pemba Scops Owl, Dickinson's Kestrel, Mangrove Kingfisher, Eurasian Moorhen, African Jacana, Black-bellied Plover, Crab Plover, Little Stint, Curlew Sandpiper, Common Ringed Plover, Saunders's Tern, Lesser Crested Tern, Great Crested Tern, White-cheeked Tern, Crowned Hornbill, Broad-billed Roller, Java Sparrow, Terek Sandpiper, Sooty Gull, Zitting Cisticola, Black-winged Bishop, Gull-billed Tern, "Diamorphic Heron" (black morph of Little Egret), Great Egret, Greater and Tibetan Sand-Plover, Senegal Lapwing, Ruddy Turnstone, Common Sandpiper, Marsh Sandpiper, Whimbrel, African Pygmy Kingfisher, Pied Kingfisher and Brown-headed Parrot. We also enjoyed two new mammals...an endemic Pemba Flying Fox and a Great Galago, a.k.a Bush Baby. A really good time on Pemba in general and overall I thought it was really successful. The hosts of our hotel were lovely and the grounds were fantastic. It was also really nice to be in a place with proper A/C as much of our extension takes place in hot and humid conditions, even when we're in the mountains. A really nice change of pace and a great haul of some fantastic birds.

#### April 6th (Day 9): Travel Day: Pemba Island to Arusha

Nothing really of note today. We woke up early and left our wonderful accommodation. We tried hard on this morning to find our last main target, the African Pygmy Goose but unfortunately, no such luck. Once we landed in Arusha, we met up with our man and we went over to our accommodation for the night, Katambuga House, a really cool place. Very comfortable, delicious food, excellent staff and a terrific garden for birding and photography...by all accounts a perfect place to settle in for the night as we began the main section of our trans Tanzania tour.

#### April 7th (Day 10/Day 1 of Main Tour): Arusha National Park

After meeting our newest member of the tour, we had a quick breakfast and then left for Arusha National Park. Once in the park, we raced around to grab as many species as possible, hitting the lake district, the forests and the savannas for an amazing day out on safari. We also took a lovely guided walk to Tululusia Waterfall and after a full day (whereabouts we had to deal with a bit of rain) we returned back to Katambuga House. Highlights for the day included (but were not limited too); Pangani Longclaw, White-fronted Bee-eater, Red-fronted and Mustached Tinkerbird, Yellow-breasted Apalis, Little Rock Thrush, Palm Nut Vulture, Nyanza, Scarce and White-rumped Swift, Cape Teal, the massively impressive colony of Greater and Lesser Flamingo, African Emerald Cuckoo, Crowned Eagle, Bronze Sunbird, Red-headed Weaver, Moustached Grass Warbler, Singing, Siffling and Trilling Cisticola, Buff-bellied Warbler, Ruff,

Great and Long-tailed Cormorant, Silvery-cheeked Hornbill, Red-fronted, White-eared and Spotflanked Barbet, Golden-tailed Woodpecker, Black Cuckooshrike, Plain Martin, Sombre Greenbul, Ruppell's Robin Chat, Eastern Violet-backed Sunbird, Long-billed Pipit, Southern Citril and a Kilimanjaro White-Eye. Arusha NP is also really great for mammals...in fact, it is the first introduction to a lot of really great animals, if the extension isn't taken that is. Highlight mammals were; Black-and White Colobus (the one with the fuzzy white tail), Olive Baboon, Vervet and Blue Monkey, Boehms Common Zebra, Bushbuck, Suni, Harvey's (Red) Duiker, Common Waterbuck and Batterby's Green Snake. While I love this park, I wasn't able to get any great photos, especially with the onslaught of rain we experienced. After a lovely day in the park, we returned to Katambuga House for a lovely dinner and a great night.

## April 8th (Day 11/Day 2 of Main Tour): Lark Plains, Acacia Scrubland to Tarangire NP

Today we left Katambuga House after a quick walk around the grounds. Here we scored a few nice birds like; Winding Cisticola, Black-backed Puffback, Red-chested Cuckoo, Arrow-marked Babbler, Southern Black Flycatcher, Black Bishop, Klaas's Cuckoo, Golden-backed and Chestnut Weaver, Tropical Boubou, Spotted Morning Thrush, African Paradise Flycatcher and a beautiful Eurasian Hobby. A pretty lovely morning but now it was time to head towards our main event for the morning, the flat expanse of the Lark Plains. In this seemingly desolate area, the small brown birds reign supreme and our job for the morning was to find a few very special individuals. Happily we did not have to search long. Amongst the Short-tailed, Red-capped and Fawn-colored Larks we found two pair of Spike-heeled Lark feeding in the short grass. There isn't much to this bird other than the fact it is a super isolated and declining species, so, very cool that we all got to see it and see it so well.

We continued walking the flats just to reach the end of the adjoining acacia scrub patch. On the walk and in the patch of acacia we noted: Rosy-patched Bushshrike, Lesser Gray Shrike, Capped Wheatear, Rattling Cisticola, Variable Sunbird, Chestnut Sparrow, Red-fronted Prinia, Redbacked Scrub-Robin, African Pipit, Taita Fiscal, Crowned Lapwing, Chestnut-bellied Sandgrouse, Kenya Rufous Sparrow, Yellow-bellied Eremomela, and a very cooperative Banded Parisoma.



Next, it was time to move into what I am calling "Thorn-scrub Area Adjacent to Lark Plains" mostly because I am not sure what else to call it and that is factually accurate - haha! Over the course of the next few hours or so, we walked the main road and into the denser forest and found some great birds like; Rufous-crowned Roller, Lesser Masked-Weaver, Scaly Chatterer, Redcheeked Cordonbleu, Purple Grenadier, Scarlet-chested Sunbird, Red-throated Tit, Pygmy Falcon, White-bellied Go-Away-Bird, Red-billed Firefinch, Gray-headed Silverbill, Gray Wren-Warbler, White-bellied Canary, Tawny-flanked Prinia, Chinspot and Pygmy Batis, Brubru, Yellow-spotted Bush Sparrow, Kenya Rufous Sparrow, Abyssinian Scimitarbill, African Gray Flycatcher, African Bare-eyed Thrush, White-headed Buffalo-Weaver, White-browed Sparrow Weaver, Little Bee-eater, Fork-tailed Drongo, Spotted Flycatcher and Nubian Woodpecker. We also managed several cool animals, the Yellow-winged Bat, Blue-headed Tree Agama and a Redlegged Sun Squirrel. After great success here we sauntered over towards Tarangire NP.

We finally made it to the gate of Tarangire National Park and got straight to work. While our driver/guide took care of paperwork, we used the facilities and while doing so, I noticed a very sweet Banded Mongoose in a burrow.

Once we got into the park, we popped the top, put the vehicle in first gear and headed in. Our time in Tarangire NP is spent mostly driving roads round and round looking for new species. For ease of the report, the next few days will be recapped in a single paragraph below...more time to enjoy some photos! :D The lodge and staff in Tarangire Safari Lodge, are lovely, making our three night stay here a real highlight for me personally but also for most of the guests. There were a few days where we easily had 120+ species per day...amazing park full of great opportunities.



We finished up the afternoon with some great birds like; Common Ostrich, Egyptian goose, Yellow-necked Spurfowl, Red-necked Spurfowl, White-bellied Bustard, Rufous-tailed Weaver, Ashy Starling, Lilac-breasted Roller, White-backed Vulture, Steppe Eagle, Blue-naped Mousebird, Eurasian (African) Hoopoe, Von-der-Decken's, African Gray Hornbill and Northern Red-billed Hornbill, European Roller, Yellow-collared Lovebird, Red-bellied Parrot, Slate-colored Boubou, Fischer's Sparrow Lark, Rattling Cisticola, Hildebrant's, Wattled and Superb Starlings, Red-backed Scrub Robin, Beautiful Sunbird, Green-winged Pytilia and flocks and flocks of Chestnut Sparrow.

#### April 9th (Day 12/Day 3 of Main Tour): Full Day in Tarangire - "Silale Swamp"

Today we would venture out over 40km to Silale Swamp. To many, 40km doesn't sound like a lot but when you have this many birds and wildlife around you well, let's just say we did 40km in just under 5-hours...you can do the math on average speed...the entire day was spent traveling towards the swamp and then back to the lodge. We again ran into rain but luckily, our amazing driver was up to the task and the birds cooperated pretty well.

We saw lots of great species throughout the day like; Striped Kingfisher, Blue-cheeked Beeeater, Gray-headed Kingfisher, Gray Kestrel, Black-chested Snake Eagle, Little Swift, Kori Bustard, Gabar Goshawk, Namaqua Dove, Buff-crested Bustard, Hildebrandt's Spurfowl, African Fish Eagle, Great Spotted Cuckoo, Great Honeyguide, Gray-crowned Crane, Pearl-spotted Owlet, Verreaux's Eagle Owl, Blacksmith, Spur-winged and Long-toed Lapwings, Northern Gray-headed Sparrow, Pied Cuckoo, Knob-billed Duck, Helmeted Guineafowl, Harlequin Quail, Coqui Francolin, Mourning Collared Dove, Bare-fared Go-Away-Bird, Water Thick-knee, Three-banded Plover, Common and Wood Sandpiper, Double-banded Courser, Whiskered Tern, Yellow-billed and Saddle-billed Stork, Goliath, Squacco and Purple Heron, Martial Eagle, African Harrier Hawk, European Honey-buzzard, African Hawk Eagle, African


Marsh Harrier, Green Wood Hoopoe, Woodland Kingfisher, European Bee-eater, Brown-crowed Tchagra, Isabelline Shrike, Flappet and Fawn-colored Lark, Desert Cisticola, Northern Piedbabbler, Silverbird, Red-billed Quelea, Village Weaver, Eastern-paradise Whydah, Reichenow's Seedeater and perhaps the most impressive number of Dwarf Bittern that I have ever encountered...incredible stuff. How's that for a day anyway...?!?! That's not including the other animals that I will disclose in a later paragraph.

#### April 10th (Day 13/Day 4 of Main Tour): 2nd Full Day in Tarangire NP - Clean Up Day!

Today's goal was to clean up on species we'd missed. While we saw and photographed many of the same species, we also added a few new ones like; African Green Pigeon, Black-bellied Bustard, Black-faced Sandgrouse, Bronze-winged Courser, Secretarybird, African Scops Owl, Broad-billed Roller, Bearded Woodpecker, Mountain Gray Woodpecker, Meyer's Parrot, African Black-headed Oriole, Mosque Swallow, White-winged Widowbird and Black-faced Waxbill.

During our time in Tarangire NP, we saw many spectacular animals. Things like fleets of African Elephants, towering Masai Giraffe, inquisitive and numerous little Kirk's Dikdik, the exceptionally consistent Vervet Monkey, several pairs of Black-backed Jackal, the adorable and somewhat lethargic looking Rock Hyrax, iconic Common Warthogs, our only look at a Bohor Reedbuck, troops of Banded and Dwarf Mongoose and individual showings from Slender Mongoose. An amazing location for mammals. We also saw plenty of lions but those were best this year in the Serengeti and Ndutu...which I will get to soon!

### April 11th (Day 14/Day 5 of Main Tour): Tarangire to Ngorongoro via Lake Manyara

Today we left Tarangire NP and headed towards Ngorongoro...easily the most beautiful place on this tour and a very, very special location. Before we got there though, we made one stop at a new watering hole and found our two last targets rather quickly...a Southern Red and Yellow-crowned Bishop colony...excellent! We also bagged a Golden-breasted Bunting while driving out of the park. Our next quick stop off was to be in Lake Manyara NP. We stop here mostly because it is on the way and it breaks up the journey. There are a few species we picked up like; Collared Palm Thrush, Dideric Cuckoo, Amethyst Sunbird, Blue-capped Cordonbleu, Yellow-billed Heron, Gray Heron, Booted Eagle, Tambourine Dove, Black-necked Weaver, Southern Ground and Crowned Hornbill. A pretty fun place but really pales in comparison to where we were headed so we stepped on it and headed for our next lodge, Ngorongoro Serena on the Rim of Ngorongoro Crater.

Another several hour drive found us at the entrance to this iconic region of Tanzania. We were short on time but we had to stop off at the first scenic overlook. Th weather was stunning, the light gorgeous and we just couldn't ignore the beauty of this crater. The greens were so vibrant and the whole area just looked so pure. It took us awhile to even realize there were roads down there and we were just in awe that we'd get to drive inside tomorrow. The overlook itself had some nice birds for us too. We saw some "rim-specialties" like; Gray-capped Warbler, Rameron Pigeon, White-necked Raven, Common House Martin and Gray-rumped Swallow. As we pulled into Ngorongoro Serena Lodge it was getting a bit dark so we didn't manage much. Instead, we decided to head inside and check out the stunning sunset from the comfort of our private 'crater view' balconies.

#### April 12th (Day 15/Day 6 of Main Tour): Ngorongoro Crater and Crater Rim

Today was our day in the Ngorongoro Crater and I, like last year, was stupidly excited. This is such a unique and special location that must be experienced by every nature lover. After an early and quick breakfast we headed for the descent road. Before even leaving the hotel property, we hit a major target, the stunning Schalow's Turaco. WOW! Continuing down the hill, we had a little misty and cloudy morning but we were still able to find a little Abyssinian Wheatear on the way down. Now in the crater we were greeted by thousands of animals. Things like; Wildebeest, Spotted Hyena, Thompson's and Grant's Gazelle, Eland, African Lion, giant, old bull African Elephants, Golden Jackal, Common Zebra and lumbering Hippopotamus. We saw a total of 4 big Black Rhinoceros...none that were exceptionally close but still an amazing tank of an animal.

Over the course of the next 7hrs (with a nice 1hr picnic lunch) or so we birded the various tracks, marshes, ponds, and forests of the crater floor and found most of our targets. Mostly it was just a dream come true to be in this haven for wildlife. Sightings included; Rosy-throated Longclaw, Red-necked Falcon, Speke's Weaver, Kori Bustard, Marabou Stork, African Spoonbill, Spur-winged Goose, Cape Teal, Red-billed Duck, Blue-billed Teal, Gray-hooded Gull, Yellow-billed Stork, Red-knobbed Coot, Kittlitz's and Chestnut-banded Plover, Little Stint, Marsh Sandpiper, Western Marsh Harrier, Black-crowned Tchagra, Mottled Swift, Pectoral-patch, Croaking, Wailing, and Red-faced Cisticola, Banded Martin, Jackson's, Fantailed and Red-cowled Widowbird, Quailfinch, Zitting Cisticola, Western Yellow Wagtail, Black Kite, tremendously huge flocks of Lesser Flamingo, distant but confirmative views of Great White Pelican, Lesser Moorhen, African Swamphen, Pied Avocet, Gull-billed Tern, and amazing views of Greater Painted Snipe.

Here we had some great luck with; Dusky Turtle Dove, Tacazze Sunbird, Streaky Seedeater, Thick-billed Seedeater, Cape and White-browed Robin Chat, Abyssinian Thrush, Brown-headed Apalis and a dozen or so Chestnut-breasted Beeeaters. ### April 13th (Day 16/Day 7 of Main Tour): Ngorongoro Crater Rim to Ndutu

The "Ngorongoro Crater Rim" is really just a term used for the areas on top of the crater and there is no specific place but in either case, our morning outing was quite successful. We managed to find some excellent birds. We saw almost all of the major targets, birds like; the striking Golden-winged, Eastern Double-collared and Malachite Sunbird put on a lovely display of color and activity for us while the rather dull but still cool Brown Parisoma skulked around in the trees above. We also saw plenty of African Stonechats and Baglafecht Weaver.

After some impeccable driving by our man Njano, we continued down the rim and made our way slowly towards Ndutu. Before we left "the rim" a large pond provided us with some distant views of Southern Pochard, a first for the trip and some great flight views of Common Swift and a very very friendly pair of Red-fronted Barbet. We arrived in Ndutu in the early afternoon and on the way to our accommodation for the night, got straight to work picking up some great birds like; Long-crested Eagle, Eastern Chanting Goshawk, Straw-tailed Whydah, White Stork, Great Spotted Cuckoo, Plain-backed Pipit, Speckled Pigeon, Common Buzzard, Abyssinian Scimitarbill, Fischer's Lovebird, Little Weaver, White-backed, Hooded and Lappet-faced Vultures, Rüppell's Griffon, Steel-blue Whydah, Gray-breasted Spurfowl, Leviallant's, Common and African Cuckoo.

We stayed in a new location this year which turned out to be just lovely. The permanent tenting site of Masek Camp was a lovely place to be based for our time in Ndutu. Not only were the accommodations lovely with fantastic food, outdoor showers and lavish rooms but the grounds themselves were really "birdy" as well! We had one spectacular new mammal for the day...the incredibly skittish and hard to find, African Wild Cat...so EPIC!



#### April 14th (Day 17/Day 8 of Main Tour): Full-Day in Ndutu

For our full day in Ndutu, we relied heavily on the expertise of our driver to pick a good route and explore specific areas of this conservation area. Ndutu is special because it is one of the few places on this tour where we are actually allowed to get out of the vehicle and literally go where the wind takes us. During our full day of exploration, we encountered several new birds (getting harder and harder as I mentioned above) and got some even better views and experiences with some birds we had seen before. Our highlights for the day were; Rufous Chatterer, Black-lored Babbler, Cardinal Quelea, Greater Kestrel, Coqui Francolin, African Silverbill, Gray-headed Social Weaver, African Gray Woodpecker, Silverbird, Buff-bellied Warbler, Dideric Cuckoo, White-tailed and Somali Short-toed Lark, Gray-backed Fiscal and the towering Secretarybird. We added several new mammals to our list as well...that is getting harder and harder as the tour progresses...same with the birds! The new mammals we added were; Bat-eared Fox and Steinbok. And even though they weren't new mammals, seeing the massive herds and trains of Wildebeest was still incredibly impressive even though I had seen it before and watching several African Lions stalking and lounging about really humbles you quick!

We made a quick stop to pick up Eared Grebe and then on the way out of Ndutu towards Naabi Hill Gate, we grabbed one of our last sandgrouse of the tour, the Yellow-throated Sandgrouse.





Our first stop after crossing the first seemingly endless expanse of nothingness was an area called Naabi Hill Gate. This is one of the main entrances into Serengeti NP so after a quick restroom break, a nice look at Cardinal Woodpecker we continued to look for bigger targets for the area. There is really no other way to put this so let's just say it outright...WE HAD AN AMAZING FIRST AFTERNOON in Serengeti NP. Incredible downpours and terrible roads couldn't stop us as we laid eyes on four big cats...that's right, FOUR! First up, an incredible encounter with Cheetah brothers...we enjoyed watching them from point blank range has they used the vehicle to tease chase zebra and one brother even jumped on a nearby vehicles spare tire to get a better vantage point...WOW. What an encounter honestly...so cool! Our next amazing cat was a hunting Serval! We watched as this cat successfully pursued a vole or rat of some kind. Spectacular stuff from this sneaky predator. Next up a sun bathing female Leopard on a giant rock placed gracefully in a Kopi outcropping. Couldn't believe our luck. Wonderful to watch this graceful hunter move about. Last but not least, the most common large cat, the African Lion...but this time a pair that had decided to use the entrance road of Serengeti Serena Lodge for a bit of mating. What an afternoon for cats!

In terms of bird life...we didn't add to many. We did add; Cape Crow, Black-winged Lapwing and we rounded out our vultures with a few White-headed Vultures. Just about every other bird like Magpie and White-rumped Shrike, Kenya Rufous Sparrow and Rufous-naped Lark were all birds we had seen really well in the past so I think everyone was pleased even though it was a lower bird count day and in my opinion, in terms of an afternoon...wow...incredible stuff! Two other animals were; Nile Crocodile and the Defasa Watebuck. We checked into our lodge, and had a fantastic dinner and went to bed early to prep for our full day in the Serengeti.

#### April 16th (Day 19/Day 10 of Main Tour): Serengeti National Park - Western Corridor

For our full day in the Serengeti, we chose to spend a majority of it in a section called "The Western Corridor". We do this to get some really tough birds. Birds like; Eastern Plantain-eater, Black-headed Gonolek, Karamoja Apalis, Dark Chanting Goshawk, Temminck's Courser, Yellow-throated Longclaw, Tanzanian Red-billed Hornbill, Gray-crested Helmetshrike, Wattled Lapwing, Gray-headed Bushshrike, Stout Cisticola, Holub's Golden Weaver (which kills me because it means we just missed ONE weaver...the endemic in Usambaras (due to terrible weather) - but we almost had a weaver sweep!) Rüppell's Starling, Black Crake, African Crake and a surprise new bird for me, the Small Buttonquail! A fantastic day that wasn't quite over. On the grounds of Serengeti Serena Lodge, just before the sun sank below the horizon, we nabbed; Mocking Cliff Chat, Scarlet-chested and Marico Sunbird. After our nightly checklist and some good food, we said goodnight and prepped to head back towards Arusha the next day.

We picked up some great birds like; White-tailed Blue Flycatcher, Purple-throated Cuckooshrike, Abyssinian Crimsonwing, Brown-backed Woodpecker, Gray-headed Nigrita, Eastern Mountain Greenbul, Gray-olive Greenbul, Mbulu White-eye, Green-headed Sunbird and by far everyones highlight of the walk, a magnificent Peter's Twinspot...awesome bird! After this successful outing we checked into our hotel and had a lovely dinner at Ngorongoro Farm House.
